Emerging Trends in College Transition and the Impact on Concurrent Enrollment

Concurrent enrollment continues to grow at a rapid pace in Colorado and nationwide – with nearly a quarter of students participating before high school graduation. As concurrent enrollment falls at the boundary of high school and college, it is either well positioned to capitalize on external influences or sandwiched between competing initiatives. Explore the impact on concurrent enrollment from efforts such as the implementation of the Common Core State Standards, strategies to reduce college remediation rates, college completion initiatives, and the pressing need to reduce the cost of college for students and families.

The Fundamentals of State and National Quality Standards

Learn how NACEP's national standards for concurrent enrollment partnerships demonstrate best practices that ensure college courses offered in high schools are of the same high quality as courses offered on college campuses. Colleagues will demystify the intent behind the standards, strategies for implementation, and alignment with the Colorado Community College System's statement of standards.

Concurrent Enrollment in Career/Technical Programs of Study

The career and technical education field can be the best avenue for developing a concurrent enrollment program. It enables students to begin earning a degree or certificate while in high school, making it easier for students to tie long-term goals to concurrent enrollment. Selecting the appropriate faculty, aligning course content and outcomes, and providing students with clearly defined pathways helps ensure successful program completions. The pathways also help potential students and their families see the benefits that can be derived from a career program.

Marketing Strategies to Build Concurrent Enrollment Programs

Developing a comprehensive marketing strategy is often overlooked as a tool for expanding and garnering support for concurrent enrollment programs. This roundtable will be a session for sharing successful strategies including the use of video, posters, social networking, data, and awards and recognition. Differentiated strategies to target specific audiences - students, parents, teachers, skeptical faculty - will be explored.

Instructor Selection, Training, and Professional Development Strategies

Communicating clearly expectations for high school adjuncts teaching in a concurrent enrollment program helps solidify the relationship between the postsecondary and secondary institutions. NACEP accreditation requires that selection of instructors must be based on the same criteria as for on-site faculty, and the postsecondary institution needs to take responsibility for training the high school adjuncts in the course requirements as well as providing on-going professional development. These processes, however, can take many forms depending on the size of the program and preferences of the postsecondary institution and secondary schools.

Navigating the Higher Learning Commission's Interest in Concurrent Enrollment

In spring 2010 the Higher Learning Commission conducted its first site visit to a high school location as part of a college's accreditation review — and it occurred in Colorado. Since that time HLC has continued to take a greater interest in concurrent enrollment and has since referenced dual credit (they term they use for concurrent enrollment) in their accreditation standards and other guidance. HLC standards and policy will be discussed, along with Lewis & Clark Community College's recent experience undergoing a HLC visit, highlighting the types of questions asked by site visitors and the evidence that impressed them.

College Readiness Strategies that Expand Access to Concurrent Enrollment for More Students

Beyond the General Education Core: STEM Courses That Engage Student Interests

To complement general education coursework such as English composition, calculus, and world languages, concurrent enrollment programs can provide students and teachers with opportunities to engage in innovative STEM courses. Climate change, global health, the biology of addiction, principles of computer science: these are topics connected to interdisciplinary research, industry, and careers. Further, they grip the attention of high school and college students, who are grappling with environmental crises, social disparities and inequality, pressures and misinformation around drug use, and rapidly evolving technology. This session will explore how these kinds of courses have been launched through the University of Washington's concurrent enrollment program.

Creating and Maintaining Equitable Relationships with High School Partners
